Activities

Students will participate in a variety of academic activities and field trips. A sample of the course programming includes:

Identity flag: Students will create unique flags to represent their interests, ideas, and traits.

Currency unit: Students will learn about Canadian money and visit the Canadian Mint.

French community: We will take a walking trip through St. Boniface to visit its many attractions and discuss the importance of the French community to Canada and Winnipeg.

Canadian citizenship: An overview of some of the concepts of Canadian citizenship, including democratic values.

Activities

Global identity: What is Canada's role in relation to the larger world? How does globalization bring us together or keep us apart? How can we work together across borders?

Traditions: We will explore unique Canadian traditions and those of students and their families.

The digital world: Students will use technology at the school's computer lab to create digital media projects such as movies and/or podcasts.

Panthera uncia

A fluffy tail that is not just for looks

The 75-centimetre-long, thick tail is used for balance when chasing agile prey along steep cliffs. It can also be wrapped around the snow leopard's body for warmth.

Habitat:

Mountain steppes and coniferous forests at elevations between 3000-5000 metres in steep terrain broken by cliffs, ridges, gullies, and rocky outcrops.

Wild Diet:

Wild sheep, goats, marmots, pikas, foxes, and porcupine.

Conservation:

The snow leopard is protected from hunting in most of their range. However, they are losing suitable habitat and prey populations and this is resulting in population declines.

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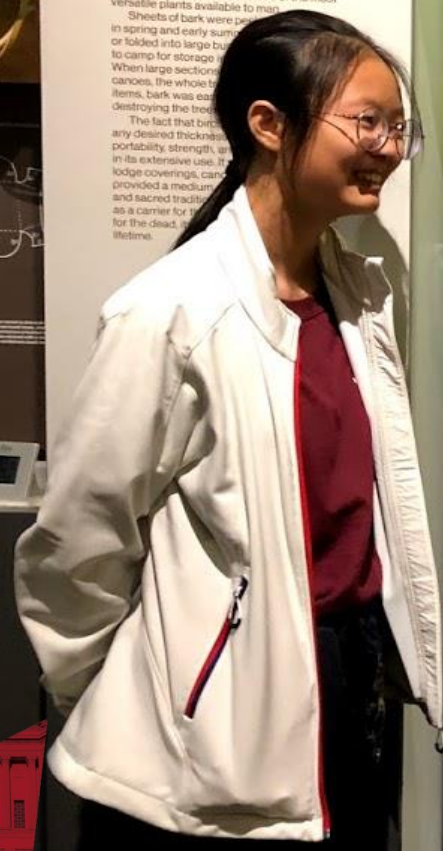

THE RICHEST PRIZE A

The large stands of birch trees (*Betula papyrifera*) found throughout the Boreal Forest were highly prized by Native peoples. Its use can be traced back to the beginnings of time when Woe-sa-kay-jac, the spiritual trickster, blessed the tree with unique characteristics and made it one of the most versatile plants available to man.

Sheets of bark were peeled in spring and early summer, or folded into large bundles to camp for storage. When large sections of canoes, the whole for items, bark was easily destroying the tree. The fact that birch any desired thickness, portability, strength, and in its extensive use.
