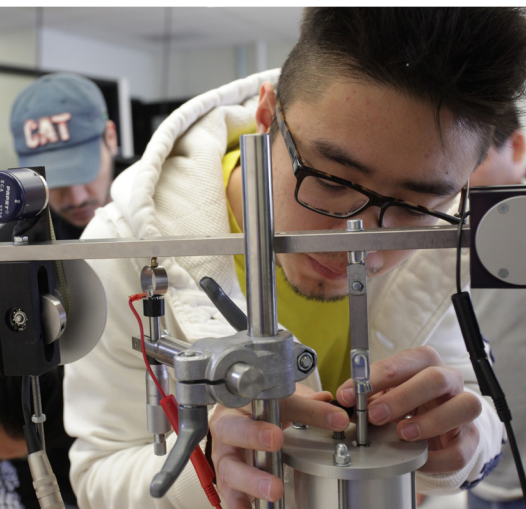

# Prerequisites for Admission

**Undergraduate Study Applicants** – at a minimum, must have successfully completed and obtained a secondary school diploma equivalent to the Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) and meet the minimum academic requirements for their program. Those requirements, by country of origin, can be found on our website at [www.laurentian.ca/international-students](http://www.laurentian.ca/international-students).

**Graduate Study Applicants** – must have successfully completed a Bachelors degree or its equivalent in a recognized postsecondary institution. A qualifying year for those applicants holding a 3-year degree might also be considered on a case by case basis, depending on the program of study. Transcripts, diplomas, and accreditations obtained outside of North America must be evaluated by The World Education Services (WES). Their services can be obtained at [www.wes.org/ca](http://www.wes.org/ca) for a fee. Laurentian requires a Detailed Evaluation Report including a course by course evaluation. WES evaluations can be submitted directly to our Office of Admissions prior to the application deadline for the program of choice. ## Language requirements for English language

If English is not your first language or mother tongue, you should provide evidence of your English language proficiency through one of the entry requirements or language tests below.

Academically admissible applicants who do not present appropriate English Proficiency Requirements will be automatically offered a conditional offer of admission based on completion of the English for Academic Preparation (EAP) program in Laurentian University's Language Institute (see page 10).

## Language requirements for French language programs

If you wish to study in a French-language or bilingual program, and your first language is not French, you must meet one of the following criteria:

- Three years of full-time study in a high school or postsecondary institution where French is the language of instruction (documentation must be provided by the student) **or**
- A minimum grade of C-1 (advanced) on the Test de connaissance du français (TCF), prospective students' version **or**
- A minimum score of C-1 at the written component of the Test d'évaluation du français (TEF).

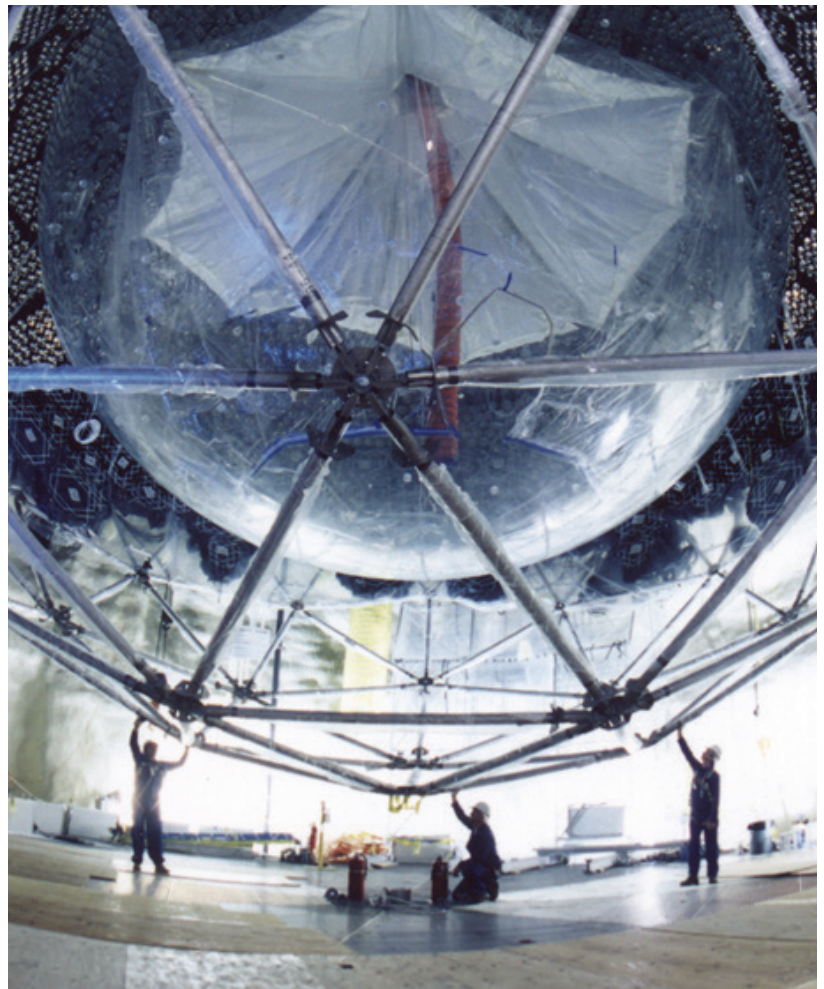
# Global Leaders

# The Laurentian Advantage



Laurentian University offers an outstanding university experience to its international students: exceptional student services, engaged and dedicated faculty, innovative programs, small class sizes, flexible start dates and responsive entry levels based on previous academic accomplishments.

English preparation and transition programs for both undergraduate and graduate levels are accessible, flexible and engaging. It's a great way to learn about your new environment, meet new friends, and prepare for what's ahead. Our offerings even include an intensive preparation program over the summer months and an outdoor adventure ESL camp for one or two weeks, at the peak of summer.



## Conditional Admission

Students who wish to upgrade their English language skills to meet admission requirements or improve their competencies prior to starting postsecondary studies in Canada can count on our Language Institute. Through a variety of preparation and transition programs, Laurentian students are equipped for future academic success.

## English for Academic Preparation (EAP)

Our Languages Canada accredited EAP program develops academic speaking, listening, reading, writing and critical thinking skills. Successful completion of Level 3 of our EAP Program meets the English language requirements for admission to full-time studies.

### EAP Program Levels

ESL: options for beginners  
EAP Level 1 = High Beginner  
EAP Level 2 = Intermediate  
EAP Level 3 = Advanced

Each level is 13 weeks in duration and offered in classrooms comprised of 8-15 learners, providing for a rich, interactive learning environment. Students at a high beginner level should expect to study 3 terms (1 year) to successfully complete the program.

## University Preparation (UP) Program

Our academic bridging program allows students to earn 6 academic credits towards a degree while continuing to refine the university skills required for a smooth transition into full-time studies. This program offers flexible start dates, small class sizes (8 to 15 students) and individualized study plans.

## Duration of English Language Studies

Each EAP level is thirteen weeks. The total duration of your EAP program is dependent on your English skill level. For example, if your IELTS score is between 4.0 to 5.0, you can expect to study English in the EAP program for 1 year before going to the degree program.

# Tuition and Bursaries

**Incoming 2019-2020 Undergraduate International Students studying full-time** – In the first year of studies, international students should expect to pay \$27,900 in tuition fees for registration in 18 to 36 credits, from September to April. Additional costs of living for an international student (not including dependants) are estimated to be around \$14,500 per academic year, which varies on an individual basis depending on the student's lifestyle.

International student and their dependants must enroll in the University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP). The premium for a single student is \$636 for the period of September 1 to August 31.

# Glossary of terms

**Undergraduate Studies** – Studies at the postsecondary level, typically for the achievement of a bachelor's degree.

**Graduate Studies** – Studies at the post-undergraduate level, typically for the achievement of a master's or doctoral degree.

**Bachelor's Degree** – An undergraduate program that covers a major area of study and that typically takes four years to complete.

**Master's Degree** – A graduate level program that follows the undergraduate degree and focuses on a particular area within a field of study. Typically, this one- to two-year program is comprised of a thesis or capstone project.

**Doctoral Degree** – The most advanced degree that symbolizes the mastery of a specific area of study or field of profession, it involves a major research project or dissertation. It typically takes several years to complete.

**Full-time status** – Enrollment in 18-30 credits per academic year

**Part-time status** – Enrolled in a minimum of 3 credits to a maximum of 15 credits per academic year

**3-credit courses** – Courses that run for a single semester (i.e. September to December or January to April)

**6-credit courses** – Courses that run for a full academic year (ie: September to April)

**BA** – Bachelor of Arts

**BAS** – Bachelor of Architectural Studies

**BBA** – Bachelor of Business Administration

**H.B.Com. SPAD** – Honours Bachelor of Commerce in Sports Administration

**B.Cosc.** – Bachelor of Computer Science

**B.Ed.** – Bachelor of Education

**B.Eng.** – Bachelor of Engineering

**BFA** – Bachelor of Fine Arts

**B.H.Sc.** – Bachelor of Health Sciences (Midwifery)

**BPHE** – Bachelor of Physical and Health Education

**B.Sc.** – Bachelor of Science

**BScN** – Bachelor of Science in Nursing

**HBSW** – Honours Bachelor of Social Work

**3-Year Degree** – requires a minimum of 90 credits

**4-Year Degree** – requires a minimum of 120 credits

**Certificate** – requires 30 credits within a distinct field of study

**Concentration** – A way of enhancing your degree by selecting a group of courses that are thematically related and requires a minimum of 36 credits within a distinct field of study

**Major** – Indicates a specialization by completing a minimum of 42 credits concentrated on one specific field of study

**Minor** – Indicates a small area of concentration by completing a minimum of 24 credits in a specific field of study

**Specialization** – Indicates a higher degree of specialization in a subject area by completing a minimum of 60 credits concentrated on one specific field of study

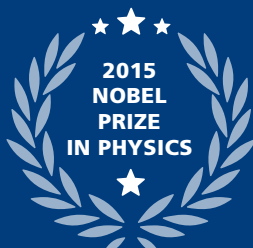
